


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Message from the Regional Chair

Each year, this survey highlights the factors underlying Halton's economic growth, which supports policy and decision making at the Region and informs infrastructure improvements that serve local residents and businesses.

The success of the Employment Survey depends on the assistance of the Region's business community. I would like to thank all those who participated in this year's survey and for their continued support in providing us their information, which helps in our Regional planning and service delivery. The Employment Survey allows Halton Region to effectively plan for growth, attract new businesses and visitors, and support economic sustainability in Halton Region - all key priorities in the Region's Strategic Action Plan 2015 – 2018.

Halton continues to enjoy strong economic growth and business investment activity. These factors helped Halton to add more than 4,000 jobs to the local economy in 2016. The quality of Halton's talent pool is second to none. Halton residents are among the most educated in Canada. It's no surprise that the 2016 average unemployment rate of 5.5% is significantly lower than the rest of the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area (GTHA), Ontario and Canada.

Over \$825 million has been invested in institutional, commercial and industrial construction in the region since 2015 with \$368.5 million invested in new commercial construction in 2016 – an increase of 33% since 2015. As companies continue to choose Halton as a place to do business, jobs are created for the local community.

Halton Region is committed to supporting and sustaining a strong, local economy, and vibrant communities. When businesses locate in Halton, they are choosing one of the best places to do business in Canada. With new commercial land development and access to a highly skilled and educated workforce, we offer a competitive home base for your business. Introduction

Halton is one of the fastest growing regions in Canada. Businesses in our area benefit from a deep talent pool of professionals, proximity to leading educational institutions, easy access to major markets and a high quality of life. Halton is evolving into a major employment area and a key market in Ontario.

This report presents the findings of the 2016 Employment Survey. It also:

- Analyzes shifts in the business and employment counts from 2015 to 2016;
- Presents information on Halton's advanced manufacturing, information technology and financial services sectors; and,
- Examines the distribution of businesses and jobs across Halton's land area.

Businesses and jobs were placed into one of three categories:

- 1. The Employment Land category includes jobs and businesses related to primary industries, construction, utilities and manufacturing. Typically, these businesses are land extensive and rely on truck transportation.
- The Knowledge-based and Institutional category includes jobs and businesses that require a post-secondary education and/or a professional certification. This category includes law firms, schools, long-term care facilities, real estate companies and design firms. These businesses are typically located in office buildings (or in other spaces that have been renovated to accommodate offices).
- The Population-related category includes jobs and businesses that enhance daily life. This category includes stores, restaurants and medical offices as well as establishments that provide services such as dry cleaning and household repairs. These businesses are typically located in or near residential neighborhoods.

Gathering information through the Employment Survey

Halton's Employment Survey runs from May to September every year. A team of nine employment surveyors visits each business in Halton to gather data about businesses and the buildings businesses occupy.

Surveyors gather data for businesses if the business has external signage. Most information is gathered through face-to-face interviews. Respondents may also provide information via telephone interviews and by completing hard copy or online forms. After the Employment Survey closes, the information collected is verified to ensure that it is as accurate as possible.

Participation in the Employment Survey is voluntary. Businesses may refuse to participate, or they may choose to only answer some of the questions (this is what causes response rates to vary by topic).

Employment Survey results may not align with other surveys conducted by Statistics Canada or the Chambers of Commerce due to differences in methodology (such as the time period during which information was gathered, the wording of the survey questions, and/or the types of businesses surveyed).





Since 2011, the majority of Halton's jobs have been full-time jobs, followed by part-time jobs and seasonal jobs. This indicates a high level of stability within the Halton economy.

From 2015 to 2016, the share of employment within the Knowledge-based and institutional sector increased by 1% while the shares in the other two categories decreased by 0.5% each.

Halton's job increase from 2015 to 2016 was over four times higher than the job increase from 2014 to 2015.





The majority of Halton's businesses have 10 or fewer employees. However, most of Halton's workforce works for a business that has 11 or more employees.


How businesses use their space



Businesses may use their space in many ways. In Halton, the most common business-related uses are for office and retail purposes. From 2015 to 2016, the number of businesses using their space for manufacturing / vehicle repair increased the most in percentage terms (by 10% or 95 businesses).



Almost two out of three businesses operate within floor areas of 3000 square feet (or less).



Offsite employment

Offsite employment comprises 11% of Halton's total employment. These employees may work from home or travel to different locations. The Employment land category has the highest proportion of offsite employment (15%) while the Population-related category has the lowest (3%).


It's common for Halton's businesses to be independently owned, staffed by 10 or fewer people and operating out of 3000 square feet of space (or less).

Businesses and jobs by North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS) codes

In 2016, the top three NAICS codes by number of businesses were all in the Population-related category: retail trade, other services (such as dry cleaners and repair shops) and ambulatory health care services. Two out of every five Halton businesses falls into one of these sectors.

On the employment side, the top three NAICS codes were much more diverse. The highest number of jobs was recorded for manufacturing, followed by retail trade and educational services. Together, these types of businesses provided employment for 39% of Halton's workforce.

Over 50% of Halton's businesses are in the Population-related category.




Jobs by manufacturing sub-sectors


In 2016, 1,655 of businesses surveyed reported operating in industries offering professional services, which accounted for 13% of Halton's business community. Combined, businesses within the professional services sub-sectors employed nearly 30,000 people.


Halton is home to a robust financial services sector, which is concentrated in Oakville and Burlington. In 2016, 940 businesses reported operating in the FIRE sub-sector, which accounted for 6% of Halton's business community. These industries employed over 12,000 people.



Population-related employment sub-categories



Over half of Halton's retail businesses sell food and beverages, clothing or general merchandise.




Jobs by other services sub-sectors

Businesses exporting goods and services*


In 2016, 488 businesses (4% of respondents) reported selling their products or services outside of Canada. The graph below shows the top ten exporting sub-sectors based on the number of businesses. Five out of 10 sub-sectors involve manufacturing products. All but one entry (professional, scientific and technical services) is within the Employment Land category.

Businesses engaged in research and development (R&D)*

In 2016, 724 businesses (6% of respondents) were involved in R&D or introduced significantly improved products, production processes or equipment. The graph below shows the top 10 research and development sub-sectors based on the number of businesses. The entries on the list are evenly split between the Employment Land category, the Knowledge-based and Institutional category and the Population Related Employment category.





Emerging Sectors

Based on 13,287 businesses

Advanced manufacturing, financial services and information technology have been identified as emerging sectors for business and job growth by various levels of government and GTHA-based alliances. Taken together, these sectors represent 17% of Halton's businesses and 23% of Halton's jobs.



Jobs and businesses within the emerging sectors are more prevalent in Halton's southern municipalities (Oakville and Burlington) than Halton's northern municipalities (Milton and Halton Hills). In all four municipalities, advanced manufacturing was the top emerging sector, followed by financial services and information technology.



Characteristics of Emerging Sector Businesses

Advanced Manufacturing

Advanced manufacturing businesses tend to have more jobs per establishment than information technology and financial services establishments. Most advanced manufacturing businesses are located within Halton's employment area. Financial services is the only emerging sector with less than half of its businesses located within the employment area.



In 2016, 92% of the places of employment surveyed in 2015 were still operating. The remaining 8% of businesses had closed or relocated.




New in 2016

Halton's 2016 Place of Employment Count: Businesses in Buildings


Overall, 99% of Halton's businesses are located in existing buildings. However, 10% of Halton's new businesses were located in new buildings.



2015 to 2016: Changes to the Employment Count


Existing Businesses

Two-thirds of Halton's existing businesses kept the same amount of employment from 2015 to 2016. One in five existing businesses added employment between 2015 and 2016, while 13% of businesses lost employment.



Jobs Lost and Gained by Changes to the Business Count

Jobs lost as a result of businesses closing or relocating slightly outpaced jobs gained from new businesses. Many new businesses (23%) did not provide an employment count.




The majority of Halton's job gains came from existing businesses, while most of Halton's job losses came from businesses that closed or relocated.



Distribution of Businesses and Jobs Across Halton

Halton's land area can be divided into three categories: the built-up area (BUA), designated greenfield area (DGA) and the outside settlement area (OSA). The BUA consists of hamlets and portions of the Urban Area that were developed prior to 2006. The DGA contains portions of Halton's Urban Area that were developed after 2006. The OSA contains areas of Halton that are outside of Halton's Urban Area and hamlets. The majority of Halton's places of employment and businesses are located in the BUA.







Building types


Throughout Halton, stores and offices are the most common types of non-residential buildings. In Halton's DGA, retail buildings house over half of all businesses. Within the BUA, nearly two out of every five businesses is housed in an office building. Mixed use buildings and places of worship house over one quarter of all businesses outside of the BUA and the DGA.















Breakdown of Burlington's Business Count





From 2015 to 2016, 92% of Burlington's existing businesses remained open while 8% closed or relocated. Over 400 businesses opened in Burlington during this time period, accounting for just over 8% of Burlington's 2016 business count. Only 7% of Burlington's new businesses were located in new buildings.













Breakdown of Halton Hills' Business Count


























Businesses operating as a head office




Businesses by size

Breakdown of Oakville's Business Count




From 2015 to 2016, 92% of Oakville's existing businesses remained open while 8% closed or relocated. Nearly 400 businesses opened in Oakville during this time period, accounting for 8% of Oakville's 2016 business count. 15% of Oakville's new businesses were located in new buildings.



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
Summary of businesses surveyed

Through the 2016 Employment Survey, 15,015 places of employment were identified. Of these, 13,287 were occupied by businesses and 1,728 were vacant.



Summary of survey response rate

The 2016 Employment Survey identified 13,287 businesses. Only 435 businesses refused to participate in the survey. More than 70% of participating businesses answered all of the questions on the Employment Survey questionnaire. This information excludes questions for which independent observations were made (such as building type and NAICS classification).



Glossary

Agricultural food value chain: Industry classification of businesses and jobs directly related to growing food, processing food, distributing food and providing consumer access to food.

Business: Single location of work that may be a for-profit establishment or a non-profit / government organization.

Employment Land category: Industry categorization of agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting, mining, quarrying and oil and gas extraction, utilities, construction, manufacturing, wholesale trade and transportation and warehousing. Typically, these businesses require large swaths of land and may emit noises, odours or pollutants.

Exporter: Businesses that sold products or services outside of Canadian borders within the last 12 months.

FIRE: Industry categorization of financial, insurance, real estate, rental and leasing services.

Full-time employment: Over 30 hours per five day week throughout the year.

Head office: Single business location overseeing operations at multiple locations within Halton, Canada or abroad.

Knowledge-based and Institutional category: Industry categorization of information and cultural industries, finance and insurance, real estate and rental and leasing, professional, scientific and technical services, management of companies and enterprises, administrative and support, waste management and remediation services, education services and hospitals. These businesses are typically located in office buildings (or in other spaces that have been renovated to accommodate offices).

Labour force: Consists of both employed (persons currently working) and unemployed (persons available to work or are seeking work) individuals 15 years of age and over by place of residence.

North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS): 2012 version of an industry classification system used throughout Canada, the United States and Mexico. For more information on NAICS visit: www.statcan.gc.ca/

Other manufacturing: The sum of jobs related to textile mills as well as the manufacturing of petroleum and coal products, leather and allied products and clothing.

Part-time employment: Under 30 hours, five days a week, throughout the year.

Population-related category: Industry categorization of retail trade, ambulatory health care services, nursing and residential care facilities, social assistance, arts, entertainment and recreation, accommodation and food services and other services. These businesses are typically located in or near residential neighborhoods.

Seasonal employment: Temporary workers employed during a portion of the year, in either a full-time or part-time capacity.

Vacant unit: A unit/building that currently has no occupant at the time of the survey, or a location from which a new business could operate.

Workforce: Consists of all paid and unpaid employees within business locations by place of work.
