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
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What is the Regional Official Plan?

- Delivery of Regional services and responsibilities as set out in Planning Act, Municipal Act and other Provincial legislation






- Regional Structure implements Halton's land use planning vision


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


Relationship between Agriculture and Natural Heritage



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Evolution of the System Natural Heritage






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Current Natural Heritage System Framework

Which Policies Apply Where?

- **Greenbelt NHS** policies apply north of the NEPA
- **Regional NHS** policies apply within and south of the NEPA
- In **overlapping area**, RNHS policies apply except where GBNHS is more restrictive.
- Key Features policy (s. 139.12) applies throughout the Region






Current Natural Heritage System General Implementation

The NHS is implemented through:

- prohibiting or restricting *development* and *site alteration* within and adjacent to the NHS; and
- triggering an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA), Sub-Watershed Study (SWS) or similar studies for *development* and *site alteration* within or adjacent to the NHS
- The applicable policy framework depends on location within the NHS



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
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Mapping Updates Natural Heritage System

 - Better reflect provincial policies and guidelines to define the NHS;
 - Recognize Planning Act approvals and OMB Decisions;
 - Use of best available GIS base data information; and
 - Recognize Special Council Permits under Halton Tree-Bylaw and Staff Onsite Refinements
- Requirement for Halton's ROP to incorporate the NHS for the Growth Plan.
- A Quality Assurance/Quality Control (QA/QC) evaluation of the proposed draft 2019 RNHS.

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
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




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
Mapping Comparison – 2009 vs. Draft 2019

The Regional Official Plan Rural and Agricultural System Objectives

- Protect farms to promote agriculture and support sector productivity for an economically strong agricultural system
- 2) Direct sales of **local produce** and other products to visitors and local communities and businesses
- Preserve farm communities, open space character and scenic views of the Escarpment









Current Agricultural Mapping

There are three main components to the agricultural policy framework in the ROP:

- 1. The Agricultural System
 - A <u>concept</u> that groups designations and constraints to set out goals and objectives for where agriculture is supported and protected.
- 2. The Agricultural Area
 - A <u>designation</u> that sets out the permitted uses for this area.
- 3. Prime Agricultural Areas
 - A <u>constraint</u> to development that identifies an area of high value agriculture to assist in the implementation of the ROP.

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



The Provincial Mapping of Prime Agricultural Areas and Candidate Areas





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




Figure 15 – Candidate Areas for Discussion

Proposed Mapping and Designation of Prime Agricultural Areas







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
Mapping Implementation Options Natural Heritage and Agricultural Systems

- Growth Plan, 2019, has indicated that the Agricultural System is made up of Prime Agricultural Areas and Rural Areas.
- The PPS now requires that Prime Agricultural Areas be designated and that NHS Key Features be identified.
- In the ROP the Natural Heritage System is a designation and the Prime Agricultural Area is a constraint to development not a mutually exclusive land use designation
- The Region has identified four options for implementation of the Prime Agricultural Area and the Natural Heritage System.
- Each option includes a different combination of designations and overlays.




Option 1

Prime Agricultural Area and Key Features are designated with a Natural Heritage System overlay.



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

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- Policy refinements to Escarpment Natural Area and Escarpment Protection Area
- Development Criteria:
 - s.27 Development Affecting Natural Heritage
- Escarpment Natural Area and Escarpment Protection Area Mapping Updates




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Water Resource System Natural Heritage

- New Provincial direction for municipalities to identify a Water Resource System (WRS).
- An approach needs to be created to map the WRS mapped at high level with policies that allow for the WRS to be refined.



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
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Drinking Water Source Protection Natural Heritage

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- A Source Protection Plan (SPP) is a list of policies and programs to protect current and future sources of municipal drinking water from contamination and overuse.
- Halton is in three different watersheds and as such is subject to the unique policies of three SPPs.



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Natural Hazards Natural Heritage

- PPS 2020 a greater emphasis on avoiding rather than mitigating natural hazards
- Natural hazards include:
 - hazardous lands,
 - flooding hazards,
 - erosion hazards,
 - dynamic beach hazards,
 - wildland fire



 Consideration should be given to how the Regional Official Plan policies and mapping for natural hazards can be strengthened and revised to address the new policies in the Provincial Policy Statement



Buffers and Vegetation Protection Zones Natural Heritage

- The ROP includes definition of "Buffer" but no policies on standard buffer widths (s.220.1.1)
- Mitigation measure for achieving no negative impact to key features in the Regional Natural Heritage System
- Greenbelt, 2017 and Growth Plan, 2019 Policy Conformity
- Region is considering options to include policies for applying buffers to key features through the planning process




Diagram of a riparian buffer in an agricultural context (from Mayer et al.2006)





Significant Woodlands Natural Heritage

- "Significant Woodland" is a "Key Feature" in the Regional Natural Heritage System (s.277 – Definition)
- Examine definition of "woodlands" and "significant woodlands" to address quality of a woodland
- For example: quality criteria could address invasive tree species or severe disturbance

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Policy Gaps

Environmentally Sensitive Areas

- Contains natural features (i.e. woodlands) and earth science features (i.e. geologic formation)
- Supports the system-based approach for the Regional Natural Heritage System
- Mapped as part of the current Regional Natural Heritage System

Centres for Biodversity

- Large landscapes >200 ha of contiguous areas of wildlife habitat;
- Encompasses existing natural heritage features and enhancement areas;
- Sufficient size, quality and diversity that can support a wide range of native species and ecological functions

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

Cootes to Escarpment (C2E) EcoPark System Natural Heritage

- There are no policies currently in the ROP that recognize the EcoPark System to support its vision and implement the Management Plans
- As part of the ROPR, the Region is considering:
 - Inclusion of polices to encourage recognition of the C2E EcoPark System and continue support the collaboration of the C2E partnerships
 - Consideration of the Management Plans as part of environmental impact assessment

Updated term in PPS and Provincial Plans:

"means those farm-related commercial and farm-related industrial uses that are directly related to farm operations in the area, support agriculture, benefit from being in close proximity to farm operations, and provide direct products and/or services to farm operations as a primary activity."



Agriculture-Related Uses Rural and Agricultural System

- 1. Must be directly related to farms in the area and primarily provide products or services that are:
 - a) Associated with agricultural operations in the area; or
 - b) Required by agricultural operations in the area; or
 - c) Enhance agricultural operations in the area.
- 2. Must be a farm related commercial use and/or a farm related industrial use which supports agriculture.
- 3. Must benefit from being in close proximity to farm operations.





On-Farm Diversified Uses Rural and Agricultural System

 Updated term in PPS and Provincial Plans which replaces "Secondary Uses":

"means uses that are secondary to the principal agricultural use of the property, and are limited in area. *On-farm diversified uses* include, but are not limited to, home occupations, home industries, *agri-tourism uses*, and uses that produce valueadded agricultural products."




On-Farm Diversified Uses Rural and Agricultural System

- 1. Must be located on a farm.
- Must be secondary to the principal agricultural use of the property (Temporal and spatial considerations).
- 3. Must be limited in area (Compared to principal agricultural use).
- 4. May be, but are not limited to, home occupations, home industries, agri-tourism uses and uses that provide value added agricultural products.

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5. Must be compatible with and not hinder surrounding agricultural operations.

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Other Policy Review Areas Rural and Agricultural System

Cemeteries

 Consideration should be given to whether cemeteries should be permitted in the prime agricultural area.

Agricultural Impact Assessments (AIAs)

 Consideration should be given to additional requirements for AIAs and policies requiring AIAs for other uses in the ROP.

Special Needs Housing

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 Consideration should be given to conditions in which special needs housing may be located outside of the Urban Area.
