
Halton Region Highlights on the 2021 Statistics Canada Census

Census Release #5a – Indigenous Peoples

Indigenous population across Halton in 2021



The Indigenous population in Halton Region was comparatively smaller than other Census Divisions within the Greater Toronto and Hamilton areas (GTHA).

The Indigenous population in Halton grew slightly from 5,455 in 2016 to 5,890 in 2021. The Indigenous population also increased in Hamilton and Durham but declined in York, Peel and Toronto.

The Indigenous population in Halton Region was 5,890 people in 2021, representing 1.0% of the overall population. The majority of Indigenous Peoples in Halton reported a single Indigenous identity - either First Nations, Métis or Inuk (Inuit).

In 2021, 1,705 people in Halton reported having Registered or Treaty Indian Status.



In 2021, the number of Halton residents reporting a knowledge of Indigenous languages was small, accounting for an estimated 30 individuals. This represented the smallest population of Indigenous speaking people in the Greater Toronto and Hamilton areas (GTHA).

Information presented in this infographic is based on the Statistics Canada 2021 Census and previous Census years. Statistics Canada conducts a national Census of Population every five years. Statistics Canada will be releasing Census findings throughout 2022 in a series of seven data releases. Definitions: Indigenous population refers to those peoples that identify as First Nations (North American Indian), Métis and/or Inuk (Inuit) and/or those who report being Registered or Treaty Indians (that is, registered under the Indian Act of Canada), and/or those who report having membership in a First Nation or Indian band.
