320,175 people comprise Halton's labour force in 2021 (aged 15 years and over).

158,605 Halton residents over the age of 15 were not part of the Halton labour force in 2021.

Halton labour force in 2021¹






Halton labour force by job permanency in 2021

While professional, scientific and technical services was the leading industry sector among Halton males, health care and social assistance was the top sector among women, accounting for 16% of the female labour force.


Leading industry sector among Halton's males in 2021




Leading industry sector among Halton's females in 2021

Place of work of Halton labour force in 2021




Over **86,000** (30%) residents of Halton (aged 15 years and over) that worked outside of their home at a usual place of work, commute within Halton.

Over **60,300** (21%) residents of Halton commute to another municipality outside of Halton.

During the COVID-19 pandemic in 2021, **153,240** Halton residents commuted by private car, truck or van to work.

This represents **64,180** fewer vehicle-based commuters than in 2016, a decrease of 42%.

In 2021, **8,045** Halton residents commuted public transit to work. This represents **19,895** fewer public transit-based commuters than in 2016, a decrease of 247% largely attributable to workers staying home due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
