Healthy Babies Healthy Children (HBHC) home visiting program

If you care for families with children under the age of six or expecting a new child, who may need extra support, Ontario's HBHC program can help by providing home visits to optimize prenatal health, child development and parenting outcomes, while reducing health inequities. Public health nurses and trained family visitors can support your patients by providing services and supports to enhance health. Reminder about measles and travelling infants

The measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) vaccine is publicly-funded for infants six months of age and older who will be travelling to countries where measles is a concern. Two additional MMR doses are still required over one year of age at appropriate intervals to meet the *Immunization of School Pupils Act* requirements and ensure long-lasting immunity to measles.
