Starting a Sole Proprietorship or General Partnership Checklist

1. STRUCTURE DESCRIPTION:	Sole Proprietorship: Business owned by one person, called proprietor.	
These types of structures do not grant you exclusive use of the business name. In order to legally protect your business name, you would have to register a trademark/trade name or incorporate.	Advantages: Simple and least expensive to set up Easy to dissolve Owner has direct control, all profits go to owner Tax advantages (losses can be applied against other income of proprietor)	Disadvantages: Owner assumes all risk of business; responsible for payment of all business debts. Creditors can seize your personal assets. Possible tax disadvantages (profits must be added to personal income)
	General Partnership: Business owned by two or more individuals.	
	Advantages: Simple and least expensive to set up Easy to dissolve Partners provide additional capital and skills Costs would be shared	Disadvantages: Partners assume all risk of business; responsible for payment of all business debts. Creditors can seize your personal assets. If disagreement arise, business can suffer Possible tax disadvantages (profits must be added to personal income)
2. CREGISTERING A SOLE PROPRIETORSHIP or GENERAL PARNTERSHIP	Business Name Registration for a Sole Proprietorship is required for all businesses operating in Ontario as a business name or trade name. The licence will provide you with a Business Identification Number (BIN) renewable every 5 years.

7. REGISTER WITH INDUSTRY SPECIFIC AGENCY (if applicable) Determine whether any industry specific licenses and/or regulations that may apply to your business.	Many business including retail and service outlets, restaurant and lounges, manufacturing and processing operations, may be subject to licences. These licences are designed to protect the interest and safety of the public regarding the use, application or sale of certain items or services. CREGISTER WITH WORKPLACE SAFETY & INSURANCE BOARD (WSIB) (if applicable)	Contact Workplace Safety and Insurance Board: 416-344-1000 or 1-800-387-0750, <u>wsib.on.ca</u> Under this legislation, independent operators, sole proprietors, some partners in a partnership and some executive officers in a corporation carrying on a business in construction are required to have WSIB coverage (some exceptions apply).	
9. OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH & SAFETY ACT (OHSA)	The OHSA legislates the rights and responsibilities for employers, supervisors and workers. Workplace safety is a shared responsibility. Visit <u>labour.gov.on.ca</u>

10. BANK ACCOUNT	Visit your local financial institution with a copy of your Master Business Licence or Article of Incorporation.
