RE: Enforcement of Immunization of School Pupils Act Winter 2020

## **QUICK FACTS**

- The Halton Region Health Department will be enforcing the *Immunization of School Pupils Act* for:
  - students born in 2002 to 2005 (grade 9 to 12) with outdated records will be suspended February 6
     through March 5 or until the Health Department receives the requested information and
  - students born in 2010 to 2012 (grade 2 to 4) with outdated records will be suspended March 26 through April 24 or until the Health Department receives the requested information.
- Your office may experience an increase in immunization-related requests as parents respond to letters from the Health Department warning those with incomplete records of possible school suspension.
- Families of impacted students have received letters indicating what information is missing. Please ask families to bring this letter with them to your office.
- All school students must have complete immunization records or a valid exemption on file with the Halton Region Health Department.

## **KEY MESSAGES FOR HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS**

- The Health Department is holding several walk-in immunization clinics next week for students born in 2002 to 2005 (high school cohort) who have received suspension orders. Please see the <u>Vaccine Information for Physicians</u> page on halton.ca for details.
- Men-C-ACYW-135 vaccine (Menactra) is required for students born in 2002 to 2005. These students should not receive MenC-C (Menjugate or NeisVacC). Students who require Men-C-ACYW-135 should be referred to the walk-in clinics noted above.
- Two doses of varicella vaccine are required for all students born in 2010 to 2012.
- Live vaccines must be given after the first birthday. They must be given on the same day or a minimum of 4 weeks apart (6 weeks is preferred).
- Some students may be eligible for medical exemptions based on serologic immunity, clinical diagnosis of
  disease or a true vaccine contraindication. The <u>Statement of Medical Exemption form</u> must be filled out by a
  medical doctor or nurse practitioner.
- If you have questions about the student's record, please call 311 and ask to speak to an Immunization Nurse.

## **KEY MESSAGES FOR PATIENTS**

- Families who object to immunization due to personal choice must attend a Vaccine Education session offered by the Health Department and complete a <u>Statement of Conscience or Religious Belief form.</u>
- Immunization is the best way to protect your child, family and community from life-threatening diseases.
