QUICK FACTS

- A multidrug-resistant strain of gonorrhea (MDR-GC) has been identified in <u>Europe</u> and <u>USA</u>. A recent Ontario case with no known travel history also had a similar drug resistance pattern (i.e. reduced susceptibility to ceftriaxone and cefixime, as well as resistance to ciprofloxacin, penicillin, and tetracycline).
- All patients, with suspected gonorrhea infection, should have both a NAAT and a culture specimen collected from each potentially exposed site (e.g. urogenital, pharyngeal, and/or rectal). NAAT is more sensitive while culture allows for assessment of drug sensitivity.
- Per the <u>Canadian Guidelines on Sexually Transmitted Infections</u>, test of cure (TOC) is recommended for all positive cases of gonorrhea at all positive sites:
 - Culture preferred for TOC and should be performed 3-7 days after treatment completion.
 - o If culture not available, NAAT should be performed at 2-3 weeks post-treatment.
- All gonorrhea cases should be re-screened at six months following treatment, given risks for reinfection or re-exposure
- If you identify any patients with MDR-GC, notify Pubic Health by calling 311 to support case management and follow-up of contacts

KEY MESSAGES FOR HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS

- For GC <u>NAAT testing</u> use the appropriate Roche cobas[®] swab sample kit or cobas[®] urine sample kit recommended by Public Health Ontario
- For GC <u>culture testing</u> use the charcoal swabs included in the *Neisseria gonorrhoeae* culture kit from Public Health Ontario. Urine cannot be tested for culture.
- The preferred treatment regimen for individuals with uncomplicated gonorrhea is ceftriaxone 250mg IM plus azithromycin 1g PO. Patients can be treated empirically before lab results.
- Alternate treatment regimens (e.g. for those with severe allergy) are outlined in the <u>Ontario</u> <u>Gonorrhea Testing and Treatment Guide</u> from Public Health Ontario
- STI medications can be ordered from Halton Region Public Health using the <u>STI Medication Order</u> <u>Form</u>
