


Halton Region ranks 4th in Ontario as the most densely populated Census Division, behind Toronto, Peel and York.



Halton's 2021 population **596,637**


Population growth between 2016 to 2021 across the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area (GTHA)



Halton's total population was 596,637 in 2021, an increase of 8.8% or 48,202 residents since 2016. Halton's population growth exceeded all upper- and single-tier municipalities in the GTHA. Among larger municipalities within Ontario, Halton Region's population growth only trailed Waterloo (9.7%) and Ottawa (8.9%).

Population change by Municipality, 2016 to 2021



The Region grew by 48,202 people between 2016 and 2021, reflecting an increase of 3,634 people in Burlington, 1,790 people in Halton Hills, 22,851 people in Milton, and 19,927 people in Oakville.


While the Town of Oakville is Halton Region's largest municipality with 213,759 residents, the Town of Milton is the fastest growing municipality in Halton, with a population percentage change of 20.7% from 2016 to 2021.



Halton has an average population density of 617.8 people per square kilometre. In Halton's more urban municipalities of Burlington and Oakville, there are 1,004.4 people and 1,538.5 people per square kilometre, respectively. In Halton Hills and Milton, there are 227.4 and 365.5 people per square kilometre, respectively.

Definitions: Occupied dwellings are permanent, private dwellings in which a person or a group of persons is permanently residing in.

Population density is the number of persons per square kilometre, the calculation for population density is total population divided by land area.
